Farmingdale retiree responds to amendment struck down at DA

he proposed UUP constitutional amendment permitting the chair of the Retired Membership Governing Committee (RMGC) limited voting at UUP Executive Board meetings was debated at the 2022 Spring Delegate Assembly, held April 9 in Albany. The proposed amendment stated that the RMGC chair would only vote on noncontractual issues related to and delimited by issues involving SUNY retirees.

At the Spring DA, more than a few individuals expressed "respect toward retirees," yet opposed them having a vote-even regarding retiree-related issues. One individual stated that since the number of SUNY retirees is quickly escalating, the retirees would soon be outnumbering and overpowering those still actively employed. This comment is wrong on both counts. While the retirees are growing in number, they still would have only one vote on the statewide Executive Board—that which is represented by the RMGC chair—and that vote is limited to only issues directly affecting retirees.

Another "nay" comment referred to the fact that the retirees have "no business"



being involved in contractual matters. This comment is also off base since the proposed constitutional amendment clearly states that the RMGC chair could not vote on any contractual matters.

I came to SUNY in 1984 as a parttimer. It took three years for me to land a full-time position. Subsequently, each promotion in rank, as well as my SUNY Chancellor's Award application, required multiple attempts. I feel we now have a similar situation where the proposed UUP constitutional amendment will require additional attempts.

My suggestion is that we resubmit the proposed UUP constitutional amendment allowing the RMGC chair limited voting rights.

Long Island

r. Daniel S. Marrone, UUP Long Island Region representative, hosted the "Coming Back Together—Long Island" meeting May 24, that included 118 participants from Empire State College in Old Westbury, SUNY Farmingdale, Stony Brook HSC, Stony Brook University West Campus, and SUNY Old Westbury.

Held at the Radisson Hotel Hauppauge, the meeting featured an array of speakers. Marrone began the meeting with a brief history of Long Island. Prior to Jan. 1, 1898, Long Island

consisted of the City of Brooklyn (Kings County), Queens County and Suffolk County. On that climatic first day of 1898, the City of Greater New York was formed and Brooklyn became one of five boroughs. Queens was divided with the western 19 percent of its area comprising the Borough of Queens and the remaining 81 percent transformed into the newly named Nassau County.

Marrone next introduced for special recognition Judy Wishnia and Barbara Maertz, founding members of the UUP Committee on Active Retired Membership (COARM) that in later years became the Retired Membership Governing Committee. Judy's granddaughter, Karen Wishnia, handed out name tags to entering guests and was in charge of compiling attendance and financial records for the meeting. Nancy Nearman, Old Westbury Chapter officer for retirees, assisted.

Stony Brook Chapter member Andrew Solar-Greco spoke on behalf of the five UUP Long Island chapter presidents. He emphasized the importance and strength of UUP in its pivotal role representing SUNY's academic and professional staff.

RMGC Chair Charlie McAteer provided a comprehensive

update on statewide UUP activities and meetings affecting retirees across New York state and Florida, the latter of which nearly 500 retired UUP members now reside.

McAteer recounted his efforts at the union's 2022 Spring

Delegate Assembly in Albany, to secure passage of an amendment to the UUP constitution.

Presently, the RGMC chair has a voice—but not a vote—on the statewide Executive Board. The amendment proposed at the DA would have permitted the RMGC chair to vote on issues affecting UUP retirees. The April 9 vote on the amendment came up three votes shy of the required two-thirds majority. McAteer promised to try again in obtaining passage of the proposed amendment at the next UUP DA.

He then introduced RMGC presidential appointee Doreen Day, who brought to the speakers' podium representatives from the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) housed at Stony Brook University.

McAteer next introduced NYSUT Retiree Council 52 elected leader Joan Perrini, who spoke in detail concerning NYSUT, an organization representing more than 600,000 people-of which 250,000 are retirees—who work in, or are retired from, New York's schools, colleges and health care facilities. NYSUT is a federation of more than 1,200 local unions, each representing its own members. UUP is a local of NYSUT, which is affiliated the American Federation of Teachers, the National Education Association and the AFL-CIO. UUP belongs to NYSUT Retiree Councils 40, 41 and 42, and votes to elect the NYSUT retiree leadership.

TIAA reps to address elder care counseling, finances via Zoom

r. Daniel Marrone, RMGC Long Island Region representative, has organized an online workshop open to all UUP retirees.

The workshop—set for Friday, Oct. 21, from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. will cover "Elder Care Financial and Legal Issues," as well as free and voluntary benefits programs for retirees.

Retirement firm TIAA is providing an expert on elder care financial and legal issues. Walter Apple, UUP retiree member services coordinator, will speak on the benefits to retirees offered through UUP, NYSUT and SUNY.

The last hour of the online workshop will be devoted to questions from participants.

Western NY

he Western NY Region met June 28 for the first time in three years at Classics V for "bruncheon." Members from the Buffalo Center Chapter, Buffalo HSC Chapter, Buffalo State Chapter, and Empire State College Chapter attended to hear all that's been happening in our retiree organization.

Buffalo Center Chapter President Ken Kern, RMGC Chair Charles McAteer, and UUP Retiree Benefits Services Coordinator Walter Apple were featured speakers. Several recently retired members were present.

Kern spoke about the relationship of the retirees and his chapter, encouraging participation when possible.

McAteer told about all that has been happening with the retirees, including:

• A proposal to grant the retiree rep a vote on the Executive

Board was turned down at the Spring Delegate Assembly (see related story, page 1);

• Retirees' relationship to NYSUT. UUP has nine votes for UUP retirees at NYSUT, giving us significant input into NYSUT.

Apple explained the new travel benefit offered through MetLife, formerly through UNUM. He also explained the UUP insurance policy of \$1,000, paid with retiree member dues., and he fielded many questions from the audience.

The three speakers received a certificate of appreciation for their participation in this event.

Tonalee Batchelor, Buffalo Center Chapter retiree, circulated a statewide petition (approved by McAteer as it had no budgetary aspect) regarding the less than minimum wage that health care aides get with no benefits. The petition is to change this situation. She asked those present for their support of this statewide proactive action by signing the petition.

Since it was Election Day, I encouraged everyone to vote.

Retiree meeting highlights: April 8, 2022

he union's statewide Retired
Membership Governing Committee met virtually April 8.
Present were Charles
McAteer, chair; F. Glenn McNitt, Capital
Region; Dan Marrone, Long Island; Ray
Guydosh, North Country; Stacey Johnson, Western New York; Eric Russell,
Metropolitan; Loraine Tyler, Southern
Tier; and Doreen Day, presidential appointee. Not represented were RMGC
members from Central New York and
the Finger Lakes.

Also on the call were UUP Membership Development Officer Tom Hoey, officer liaison, and staff member Walter Apple, retiree member services coordinator.

Guests included Jo Schaffer, immediate past RMGC chair; Richard Tyler, RMGC Finance Committee member; Florence McCue, NYSUT retirees; some chapter officers for retirees; and other interested retirees

McAteer called the meeting to order at 11:17. The Code of Conduct was read.

Minutes of Jan. 13 were adopted as written. Moved by Guydosh and seconded by L. Tyler.

Chair Report-McAteer

- Vacant RMGC Long Island Region Representative seat. L. Tyler moved and McNitt seconded that Dan Marrone be appointed to fulfill the remaining oneyear term, given he had the second most LI region representative votes. Passed.
- Status of constitutional amendment for partial voting rights for the RMGC chair (who serves currently as a nonvoting member of the statewide Executive Board) to have limited voting; it was unanimously approved by the UUP Executive Board. If adopted by delegates to the Spring DA, the RMGC chair would not vote on contract issues, terms and conditions of employment, and the union's annual budget (see related story, page 1).

- Retirees in the ORP can use autodeduction for VOTE/COPE contributions, effective December 2022.
- Negotiations for the MetLife Insurance program was done on our behalf without our final input. In the past, a subcommittee was established to participate. The committee needs to be reconstituted in the future.

MDO comments-Hoey

- UUP now has 6,363 retirees
- Pre-retirement workshops offered frequently by W. Apple used as an organizing tool.
- The Executive Board recommended the amendment allowing the RMGC chair limited voting, except issues related to bargaining, terms and conditions of employment, and budget). He said retirees bring institutional memory, wisdom, experience, and loyalty to discussions.

NYSUT Representative for Retirees—McCue

- ED 52 includes all higher ed retirees; UUP retirees are represented by Retiree Councils 40, 41, and 42, with nine votes of 52.
- NYSUT is 650,000 strong, including 270,000 retirees. UUP retirees are mem-

bers of NYSUT with no dues paid.

- Working with UUP to get more fulltime lines in SUNY. Getting more involved with retirees around the state.
- Blueprint for Successful Retirement, NYSUT benefits listed on NYSUT.org and in our retirement brochure.
- \bullet $\it The$ $\it Active$ $\it Retiree$ is distributed to all regional NYSUT presidents.

Finance Committee Report and Budget Discussion—R. Tyler

- Current budget based on our last "regular" year in 2019. Accepted unanimously.
- Expected revenue for the 2022-2023 fiscal year, rounded to nearest dollar, is \$322,150:

Projected expenses include:

- Administrative expenses, \$146,974;
- Retiree life insurance, \$132,275;
- Governing expenses, \$4,500;
- Meetings/travel, \$4,000;
- Outreach support, \$100;
- Regional meetings, \$24,876; and
- Other, \$19,425.

Guydosh moved and Marrone seconded to approve the 2022-23 budget. Carried.

• Discussed purchase of UUP/NYSUT Union for Life pins, as well as jackets for RMGC members and Walter Apple.






SUNY Poly retiree pens three books in three years

UNY Polytechnic Institute-Utica retiree member Vinood Kool kept busy during the COVID-19 pandemic—writing three books on Gandhi.

The books—published by Macmillion between 2020 and 2022—are based on Kool's research

conducted for more than four decades, as well as from interviews with the family members of Gandhi and his followers, and archives in India. Kool also interviewed nonagenarian Justice Dharmadhikari, a close associate of Gandhi, at his home in Mumbai, India, in 2017, shortly before Kool's retirement from SUNY.

SUNY names first retiree to UFS committee

UP retiree Daniel Scott Marrone recently became the first SUNY retiree to be appointed to a SUNY University Faculty Senate (UFS) committee.

"Being asked to serve on the UFS Governance Committee sets a precedent that opens the door for other SUNY retirees to serve on UFS committees," said Marrone, the union's Farmingdale Chapter officer for retirees and Long Island

Region representative on the statewide Retired Membership Governing Committee.

But it wasn't as easy as to be appointed as one might think. First Marrone had to apply to the UFS parliamentarian (Downstate Chapter retiree Henry Flax) to determine if retirees were eligible to serve on UFS committee. Once over that hurdle, he had to be accepted by the UFS Executive Committee.

"I had the great honor to be mentored by Dan when I served as his alternate in the Faculty Senate. And when his term expired, I was privileged to follow in his footsteps," said Farmingdale Chapter colleague Lou Scala. "Thanks to Dan's efforts, this opportunity for service and continued UUP influence in the statewide governance process is now open to retirees.



Ethel Roosevelt Derby-Founder of the American Red Cross on LI

.S. President Theodore Roosevelt (1858-1919) and second wife, Edith Kermit Carow Roosevelt (1861-1948), had five children. All had interesting lives, including Ethel Roosevelt Derby.

Residing in the White House during her father's presidency (1901-1909), down-toearth, practical Ethel (1891-1977) assisted her mother in first lady responsibilities.

Barely in her teens, Ethel decided to become a nurse. While treating the sick in hospital wards, she met Dr. Richard Derby, whom she married in 1913. After World War I erupted in 1914, the newlywed couple volunteered to serve in wartorn France. As Derby, a major in the U.S. Army Medical Corps, was tending

wounded soldiers near the front lines, a German cannon shell exploded just yards from him, rendering him unconscious for hours. Derby never fully recovered from the head trauma he sustained in WWI. When he returned to the U.S.A., the young doctor practiced medicine, but chronically suffered from severe headaches. Derby also experienced post-traumatic stress disorder. In 1922, Richard and Ethel's eight-year old son, Richard Derby, Jr., perished from sepsis. This became a breaking point for Ethel's husband. For six years, Derby was affected by debilitating anxiety and depression. By 1928, he was well enough to resume his medical career, but on a far more limited basis. Ethel did her best to cope with her husband's medical problems, while at the same time raising three surviving children and leading Long Island's branch of the American Red Cross. In his later years, Derby resided at a Vermont rest home. He passed away at age 72 on July 21, 1963.

Following her mother's passing in 1948, Ethel successfully negotiated the transfer of her parent's home, Sagamore Hill, to the U.S. National Park Service—henceforth becoming the Sagamore Hill National Historic Site. The site has remained one of the most visited units of the National Park System. Ethel also served



for many years as a trustee at the American Museum of Natural History--an institution her grandfather, Theodore Roosevelt, Sr. (1831-1878), founded in 1869. Post-presidency, TR contributed to the museum thousands of specimens brought back from his African safari. On January 19, 2022, his equestrian statue was removed from the museum's entrance and relocated to the Theodore Roosevelt Presidential Library in North Dakota.

Ethel was a prominent community leader in Oyster Bay, Long Island during the 1960s and 1970s. In this capacity, she became an outspoken champion for civil rights causes. Strongly supporting the Civil Rights Movement, Ethel advocated for the rezoning and building of housing for low-income families in Oyster Bay. For bringing African American families to her home town, she endured

harsh scorn from her rich, not-in-my-backyard neighbors. Nonetheless, Ethel tirelessly continued the fight for equitable housing. Successful as a community leader and spokesperson, Ethel Roosevelt Derby became known as the "Queen of Oyster Bay."

Ethel's greatest achievement was her role in establishing the American Red Cross on Long Island during WWI. She continued to be active in the organization for over sixty years. When Ethel reached 70 years of age, her children requested that she sit for a portrait. In setting-up the painting, the artist asked Ethel to wear her most prized evening gown and jewels. Instead, she donned her well-worn American Red Cross uniform.

After a lifetime of service to her hometown and nation, Ethel Roosevelt Derby passed away at the age of 86 on Dec. 10, 1977.
